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Message from the Chairman

35 years ago, Taawon was born to strengthen the steadfastness of our people in Palestine, and to support refugee camps in Lebanon. Throughout this journey, we touched the lives of one million Palestinians annually, and we invested more than US\$ 800 million over these years. A wide range of segments within our Palestinian nation benefited, especially children, youth, women, and those with special needs. This was done by supporting Palestinian civil society organizations working in education, culture, arts, social and economic development, revitalization of historic and religious buildings in Palestinian villages and cities, in addition to building of the Palestinian Museum that crowns Taawon's achievements in the cultural sector, enhancing Palestinian identity and its interaction with global civilizations. Added to these programs are the humanitarian and emergency assistance programs and the Orphan Support Program.

Throughout these years, we realized several achievements through which Taawon won respect and recognition on both national and international levels. As a result of the efforts exerted by the organization, our interest in setting strategic plans that respond to the needs, our implementation of programs and subjecting them to rigorous evaluations and audits, continuously reviewing the components and fundamentals of institutional work, whether to enhance performance and expand impact, or to respond to the needs of our people and the challenges of our cause, we adopted the program-based management system last year, as well as initiatives to integrate disruptive technologies into many programs. We are currently assessing our experience with the goal of designing developmental initiatives that result in a positive transformational

2018 witnessed important and decisive moments for Palestine. It is a year that marks the passing of 100 years since the doomed Belfour Declaration. The dangers facing our history and homeland intensified, the latest of which was the announcement of Jerusalem as Israel's capital. This coincided with the Judaization projects of the Holy City, the expulsion of its inhabitants, the displacement of its people, and combating all Arab and Palestinian identity within the city. This year has also witnessed the cut in US financial support to the United Nations Relief and Works Agency (UNRWA) in the amount of US\$ 350 million that poses a serious threat to the sustainability of the Agency that provides its services to millions of Palestinian refugees, as well as the right of return of Palestinian refugees to their stolen land.

In light of this dangerous reality and complex challenges within Palestine and outside, our responsibility and burdens increase, driving us to move forward with our work with more stability, will, steadfastness, professionalism, transparency and independence to achieve our mission. A mission that is focused on enhancing steadfastness, empowering Palestinian individuals and their institutions to live in Palestine in freedom and dignity. In this context, we take pride in our partnership with the organizations and the governments that complement our efforts and extend our gratitude to them for their continuous support and their unlimited belief in Taawon's mission. We would like to extend to each of them our deepest appreciation and gratitude. We vow that Taawon will continue, and so will its journey.

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Message from the Director General

By the end of 2018, 35 years of Taawon have passed, through which we exerted great efforts to empower the Palestinians economically and socially, to enjoy a dignified life in Palestine and in the refugee camps in Lebanon.

Today, we present to you the 2018 annual report that displays major achievements made by the organization in general, and on the level of the 7 main programs of Taawon according to the 2030 Sustainable Development Goals. Expenditure amounted to approximately US\$ 53 million, distributed over our areas of operation in the West Bank, including Jerusalem, Gaza Strip, 1948 areas, and the refugee camps in Lebanon. These interventions have led to a total economic return of US\$ 53 million. Our programs met the needs of around one million beneficiaries, out of which 45% were women, and in strategic partnership with 500 local organizations. We succeeded in providing about 4,850 job opportunities through all programs.

2018 marked a significant increase in the degree of networking with donors and international organizations. Relevant indicators included the increase in the number of strategic partnerships, signed agreements, opening up new fundraising channels, coinciding with our introduction of the best humanitarian initiatives. We launched a campaign supporting the steadfastness of our people in Gaza titled "Support Palestine... An Appeal for Gaza Relief", that was followed by another campaign to support the East Jerusalem Hospitals' Network and the United Nations Relief and Works Agency (UNRWA), through which over US\$4 million were collected to support the steadfastness of our people in Gaza Strip and Jerusalem.

Our work was not limited to the provision of relief support, as work continued to support national institutions and developing infrastructure.

Our work was not limited to the provision of relief support, as work continued to support national institutions and developing infrastructure, as we inaugurated a specialized clinic and an emergency center in Al-'Ubeidiyyeh village; East of Bethlehem District, in cooperation with the Palestinian Red Crescent Society. The clinic will serve around 30,000 inhabitants. We have also renovated the only clinic within the old city of Nablus, which offers its free services to around 10,000 patients from the old town annually. We inaugurated the 30th Bayyara Playground in village of Burga within Ramallah District. As for education, we opened the doors for the second round of registration in youth leadership capacity building program "Bridge Palestine". We have also inaugurated the Center for Simulation and Visual Arts at Al-Quds University and have launched the 7th round of the University Fellowship Program "Zamala".

As part of the Old Cities Revitalization Program, we renovated the facade of Al-Khalidiyyah Library, one of the oldest libraries within the Old City of Jerusalem. We have also rehabilitated and revitalized Al-Amim area in the Old City that was under threat of confiscation. With the aim of reviving the commercial and economic life of the Nablus residents, we renovated Al-Manara square in the Old City of Nablus, which is considered one of the oldest commercial squares in Palestine. In recognition of the innovative efforts to enrich excellence and achievement in Palestine, we announced the winners of the 2017 awards for a total value of US\$ 420,000. On the cultural front, the Palestinian Museum inaugurated the "Labor of Love: A New Look into Palestinian Embroidery" exhibition. It is the first exhibition of its kind tracing the transformations in Palestinian embroidery, striving to establish a comprehensive picture of the materialistic history of Palestine. At the end of 2018, we received the Mahatma Award in Creating Change for our distinctive performance in providing the best humanitarian services.

On the front of work development, we evaluated a number of the main programs and conducted internal and external environmental analysis in preparation for the development of the 2020-2022 strategic plan. We also obtained the ISO 9001 Certification for our distinctive project management in accordance with the international quality standards, in addition to our progressive performance in risk management, complying with donor's legal regulations and requirements, and for our focus on building the capacities of our partners and beneficiaries who expressed their highest satisfaction.

I would like to express my utmost pride in working with all partners and would like to extend my gratitude and appreciation to the members and donors; individual and organizations for their generous support of our programs and projects. I highly value the performance of Taawon's outstanding team whom I take pride in working with, as they have proven an extraordinary commitment and qualification throughout the years in sustaining this organization to serve our country; Palestine.



35 Years of Taawon

The journey started and the work for Palestine commenced. A group of us met 35 years ago, with a common goal that continued over the years; to empower the Palestinian individual and its institutions, and preserve dignity, culture and identity as the basis for steadfastness and building the ability to face the different changes in Palestine and refugee camps in Lebanon. In light of the changing and volatile situations through which Palestine and its people had gone, responsibilities and burdens have increased on our organization, necessitating the continuity of our work in more stability and with a clearer vision and flexibility. Throughout these years, we have accomplished many achievements in terms of supporting steadfastness, developing institutions and changing reality. Taawon has also gained respect and appreciation on various local, international, and Arab region levels, as a result of its developed governance system, the efforts exerted by the members and staff, our constant revision of the strategic plans, and for our focus on implementing practical plans and adequate evaluations. This has resulted in receiving several certificates of quality and distinction like the Aga Khan for Construction, Campden for Charitable Work, Global Reporting Initiative Certification 'A' Level, and another certificate for our commitment to the 2030 Sustainable Development Goals Indicators. Recently, we obtained the ISO Certificate for Civil Society Organizations, and the Mahatma Gandhi Award for Community Work, which is awarded to change-making organizations across the world that contribute to developing solutions to the most difficult community challenges that negatively affect people's lives.

Over the years, the number of members has increased reaching 200. We have worked with hundreds of implementing and strategic partners; donors; individuals and institutions and local and international decision makers and experts, who were all partners in planning,

and implementation, and partners in reaping the fruits of the joint work. Our programs were developed based on the accumulated experience, ability to analyze the situation, and systematically identifying needs.

We have faced many local and international challenges, as we operate in difficult and complicated political, economic and social circumstances that necessitate much flexibility in planning and implementation, as well as rapidly responding to emergency situations. Despite all the challenges, we move forward with much determination, professionalism, perseverance, transparency, and independence as you have entrusted us. Together, we have worked as active and giving members of the organiztion alongside an efficient and steadfast executive body, as well as partners, friends and donors who are supportive to our mission and values. We continue our journey together for Palestine.

Stemming from Taawon's approach to development, growth, keeping abreast the latest global developments in the field of community work, and within its focus to increase its impact through empowering the Palestinian individuals and civil society organizations operating in Palestine, Taawon seeks to employ creative ideas that are in line with the Sustainable Development Goals 2030 and are responsive to the needs of th Palestinian local community. Taawon will do so through focusing on key development initiatives that employ the latest technological advancements to achieve higher levels of efficiency in the organization's operations, and its interaction with the implementing partners and the donors in a comprehensive manner that includes the various stages of planning, development, monitoring and performance advancement.

Since establishment, Taawon invested around UD\$800 million distributed over 4 phases, where one million Palestinians benefitted annually, from the various interventions in education, culture, health, agriculture, organizational empowerment and capacity building along with infrastructure development, in addition to humanitarian assistance and relief in emergency situations. These phases changed based on needs related to the various political and economic situations that affected Palestine.

Phase 1: Support Steadfastness and Self-dependency

Work begun on different sectors to meet multiple needs including education, health, economic, social and institutional development, culture, arts, emergency and humanitarian assistance.

Phase 2: Development and Revitalization

The Association has identified 3 major development programs: institutional development, human resource development, culture support and identity promotion. In 1994, the Association launched the Old City of Jerusalem Revitalization Program.

Phase 3: Relief and Revitalization

After the Second Intifada in 2000, work focused on

providing emergency relief to harmed people and victims of the Israeli reoccupation of Palestinian areas, while continuing to implement the major development programs of the previous phase.

Phase 4: Development and Steadfastness


Basic programs have developed and expanded, including education, community development, culture, emergency and humanitarian assistance. The stage was characterized by the implementation of the Orphan Support Program in Gaza, the Revitalization of Wadi Gaza Village and the Youth Employment Program.

During the last years, Taawon focused on enabling core programs and started the Program-Based Management through 7 specific programs.

This period was also identified with launching unique education programs such as "Tafkeer," "Zamala" and "Bridge Palestine."

The various systems in the Association have been automated, communication mechanisms have been developed and many international quality certificates have been obtained. In addition, working within the Sustainable Development Goals was institutionalized.

Highlights of 2018

Taawon celebrated its 35th anniversary this year with the slogan of "35 vears of Taawon" to reflect the continuity of strengthening the working relations and networking with the stakeholders. 2018 was a remarkable year, as it marked the deployment of modern development ideas that Taawon aims to implement to make tangible growth. The most important accomplishments include conducting 11 needs assessment and evaluation studies of Taawon's programs in the different geographic areas. Other achievements include joining the Core Humanitarian Standards Alliance as a member to increase networking with donors and international organizations. Taawon has also launched several crowdfunding campaigns, through which more than US\$136,000 were raised, and has intensified its effort to increase its visibility through traditional and modern media channels. A focus was given to team capacity building in various fields, as 45 training workshops were held where 85 staff members benefited. Within its adherence to the best international guality standards, Taawon was awarded the International Quality Management Certificate ISO 9001:2015, and has been employing the risk registry in its work, while continuing to integrate automated systems and smart phones applications to develop its operations.








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
Total expenditure amounted to US\$58 million, approximately US\$53 million of which were allocated for program expenditure, distributed as follows:

A Gateway to Distinction: The First Step for Students Towards International Universities

Over the course of a full year, more than 140 students at schools in Jerusalem participated in the "Gateway to Distinction" program implemented by Al-Nayzak Organization for Supportive Education and Scientific Innovation in partnership with Taawon and with the support of the Arab Fund for Economic and Social Development. It aims to develop the skills of Jerusalemite students from 8th and 9th grades in critical thinking, scientific research and English language in an enjoyable productive process. It also enables them to face challenges and employ life skills to make positive change in their lives and enhance their opportunities to keep up with the global scientific and technological development, thus contributing to enhancing the role of young people today and in the future.







Bring Joy and Hope Back to Jerusalem

Al-Farah Centre came to fulfil the needs of Jerusalem students in 8 schools, aiming at supporting the educational process of students with learning difficulties. This is done through offering educational support, individual diagnosis, building an individual education plan, and implementing it throughout the year. Academic consultancies and educational workshops for teachers and parents were also provided. 150 students, 60 teachers and all relevant family members benefited from the Center. The project is funded by the Arab Fund for Economic and Social Development, in partnership with Taawon and implemented by the Frere School in Jerusalem.

Students of the "Bridge Palestine" Program Bring Happiness with their Outstanding Community Initiatives in the Gaza Strip

120 students implemented various community initiatives that touched upon the daily lives of Gaza Strip residents. Within the second phase of the Program, students developed various initiatives, which were welcomed and encouraged by the families, beneficiaries and several influential people in the community.

Cultural Initiatives

Students met officials from academic institutions to carry out activities with university students. Female students conducted classroom exercises on the role of youth and the most important challenges they face during and after school.



Heritage Initiatives

The initiatives included introducing the public to historical and archaeological sites and drawing their attention to the sites through the implementation of cleaning and awareness campaigns, where they cleaned the historic "Al-Kamiliyyeh School" courtyard in the Gaza Strip. This helped in showing the beauty and the importance of the historic and archeological place.

Environmental Initiatives

Initiatives focused on preserving the environment, either directly through tree planting in schools and public places, or indirectly through the implementation of training activities for school children to raise awareness of the importance of waste recycling in school and at home. Also, awareness-raising activities on how to take care of stray animals in public places took place.

Health Care Initiatives

Health care activities included caring for sick children and elderly through organizing visits and many activities, as well as, community awareness campaigns on the importance of caring for the elderly.

Taawon managed as part of a project titled "For My Identity.. I Sing", funded by the Arab Fund for Economic and Social Development, to incorporate a group of students in an artistic club and a school choir to enhance their communication skills and artistic perception. This led to a better relationship among students and opened new horizons for them in the field of music and theater.



Culture Program Supporting the Homeland, Preserving an Identity

A Long Exciting Journey with Tales - Lebanon

The project focused on building the capacity of tale narrators by training them on body language, voice exercises, and enhancing communication between them. A degital communication platform was developed in which they share their news and their performances. This strengthened the relation between them and instilled enthusiasm to continue the work and to develop it further.

One of the tale narrators was chosen to participate in French and Swiss festivals, with the support of the trainee Jehad Darweesh. An annual Tales Festival was initiated joining tale narrators from Palestine, Egypt and France. It became an annual ritual, anticipated by the audience. We must not forget that guiding them towards professionalism allows them to gain financial income, and at the same time sustain this art.

From Ramallah to Santiago, Gamiphy Company

Aws participated in the Santiago challenge for emerging companies, supported by Taawon in partnership with Korea International Cooperation Agency (KOICA) and implemented by "MENA Catalyst" Foundation, as part of a project titled "Developing the Network of Business Supporters from the Palestinian Diaspora". When his company joined Santiago's Competition as one of eight emerging Palestinian companies, Aws met a group of 42 investors and business owners from the Palestinian diaspora in Chile, in addition to a number of business and entrepreneurial development centers, in order to meet the challenge of opening prospects for the growth of promising Palestinian companies through access to guidance and possible opportunities, access to primary investments and enhancing prospects for working with the diaspora in Chile.

Gamiphy, specialized in the utilization of electronic games as a tool for digital marketing, took part in one

of the leading business acceleration programs "Seed Generation 21", which ranks among the top ten programs to accelerate the growth of emerging companies worldwide, and is also ranked the first program in Latin American countries. With the participation of Gamiphy in this global program, in parallel with other start-ups from 22 countries, not only did Gamiphy receive initial funding (25 million Chilean Peso), but the Executive Director and his family got a one-year residence in Chile as well, in addition to providing him with the use of a free shared space equipped with all technologies with a group of entrepreneurs from around the world. Moreover, he was offered to join an intensive program to accelerate the growth of the company for 6 months under the supervision of international experts, and access to a network of mentors, investors and international companies.



Hospital Support

With support for various health projects, we were able to provide Palestinian hospitals with necessary and modern equipment. Raising the efficiency and quality of health services provided, decreased transfers to Israeli hospitals and decreased treatment durations especially in areas of Pediatric Cardiology, burns, kidney dialysis and cancer treatment.

Jehad Overcomes his Disability and Starts his Own Business

Jehad, 29 years old, lives with his family of 18 members, in a small house. 7 of the family members are children, 5 are persons with disability and with low income. After Jehad was injured with an explosive life ammunition in his leg, he is now with a permanent physical disability, which did not stop him from pursuing his life. He joined a training course on electrical wiring, as part of the vocational training project for persons with injuries causing disabilities. This course is implemented at Iradah Center for Vocational Rehabilitation and Training for Persons with Disability, funded by Taawon. Today, Jehad walks out of the house holding his simple equipment happily going to implement electric extension work for his neighbors' homes. His love for work pushed him to buy basic equipment with the help of his father, and started marketing himself as an electric wiring technician in the area where he lives. He is also ambitious to open his own shop to earn his living and help his family.




Completing the Construction of the New Housing Project in Wadi Gaza Village, with 124 housing units. The project was implemented in cooperation with The Ministry of Public Works and Housing and funded by Kuwait Fund for Arab Economic Development in the total amount of US\$4.4 million.

'Omar 'Abdulhadi Playground, Burj Al-Barajneh – Beirut

It is a place for entertainment, sports and cultural gathering. It includes a playground for children, a basketball and football courts and a table tennis, along with classrooms that can be used for different activities. In addition, it is an extension of Al-Qassam Kindergarten and the library of Said Khoury, one of the public libraries of Taawon. Since its opening in August, it hosted more than 3500 children and more than 1000 persons. 75 children visit the playground on a daily basis. Another two sports clubs were built and equipped at Ar-Rasheediyyeh and Burj Ash-Shamali Camps. They are the first two sports clubs in the area, attracting both men and women, offering job opportunities, and offering a safe environment to which people react positively.





The building and furnishing of female student dorms for Birzeit University with the support of the Government of the Kingdom of Saudi Arabic through the Saudi Development Fund. The project, comprised of three buildings, aims at providing modern and suitable housing for 550 students.

Al-Amim Land: A Dream Coming True

In cooperation with Burj Alluglug Social Center Society and Al Nammari Family, owner of the confiscated piece of land, with the support of the Arab Fund for Economic and Social Development, with supervision and implementation of the revitalization program in Jerusalem, the piece of land was retrieved from the Israeli government subject to public use. The Exhibition "Labor of Love: A New Look into Palestinian Embroidery"

In March 2018, the Palestinian Museum opened its first exhibition "Labor of Love: A New Look into Palestinian Embroidery". The exhibition dealt with the theme of Palestinian embroidery from a different perspective, highlighting its various aspects: gender, the labor involved, the symbols, the commoditization, and the social classes. It also portrayed the transformations the history of Palestinian embroidery has witnessed, starting from its connections to the Palestinian woman and being expressive of her, to transforming into a visual and national symbol of the Palestinian cause and revolution, to contemporarily being used as an artistic, cultural and commercial product. The exhibition and its accompanying educational, cultural, and public programs attracted many people interested in Palestinian heritage and embroidery, as well as universities, schools, civil society organizations around Palestine and historic Palestine. The exhibition included 375 pieces of embroidered dresses, jewelry, videos, archived pictures and posters that were borrowed from 32 different collectors, institutions and museums. More than 80 volunteers participated in the exhibition that received huge number of visitors from all over historic Palestine.

The Palestinian Museum A Voice for Every Palestinian



Palestinian Digital Archive

A virtual platform that is rich in photos, materials, and information conveying inheritance and heritage, documenting collections of photographs, films, audio recordings and other important materials threatened with loss, damage or confiscation. By digitally archiving those materials, they will form an electronic digital archive accessible to researchers, artists and the general public on a designated virtual platform at the museum and on virtual platforms of other European partner institutions to reach as large of an audience as possible. This project is funded by Arcadia Fund.

Palestinian Trips

In partnership with the Institute for Palestine Studies, and in cooperation with "Visualizing Palestine", the Palestinian Museum launched a project titled "Palestinian Trips". It is an interactive digital platform that is rich in historic events and facts, biographies, tales and stories. This platform allows the visitors the opportunity to browse and explore the interactive timeline of the Palestinian cause, and discover unknown stories about the history, culture and society of Palestine. It is a comprehensive and extensive narrative that highlights the effective role played by Palestinians in the making of their history. The platform will include a geographical information system (GIS) through which the destroyed villages in 1948 will be exhibited as inspired by Walid Khalidi's book "Not to Forget."

Establishment of a Studio for the Preservation of Threatened Paper Documents

The Palestinian Museum has been awarded the Cultural Protection Grant of the British Council for the preservation of 3,000 paper documents, and manuscripts threatened by damage, loss or confiscation from important collections of modern Palestinian history from 1800 until today.

Financial Statements



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Independent Auditor's Report To the General Assembly of Welfare Association (Taawon)

Opinion

We have audited the financial statements of the Welfare Association (Taawon), which comprise the statement of financial position as at December 31, 2018, the statement of activities and changes in net assets and the statement of cash flows for the year then ended, and notes to the financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies.

In our opinion, the accompanying financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of Taawon as at December 31, 2018, and its financial performance and its cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with International Financial Reporting Standards (IFRS).

Basis for Opinion

We conducted our audit in accordance with International Standards on Auditing (ISA). Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section of our report. We are independent of Taawon in accordance with the International Ethics Standards Board for Accountants' Code of Ethics for Professional Accountants (IESBA Code), and we have fulfilled our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with the IESBA Code. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion.

Responsibilities of Management and the Board of Directors for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in accordance with IFRSs, and for such internal control as management determines is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error. In preparing the financial statements, management is responsible for assessing Taawon's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless management either intends to liquidate Taawon or to cease operations, or has no realistic alternative but to do so.

The Board of Directors is responsible for overseeing Taawon's financial reporting process.

Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance, but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with ISA will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of these financial statements.

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As part of an audit in accordance with ISA, we exercise professional judgment and maintain professional skepticism throughout the audit. We also:

- Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error, design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks, and obtain audit evidence that is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control.
- Obtain an understanding of internal control relevant to the audit in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of Taawon's internal control.
- Evaluate the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates and related disclosures made by management.
- Conclude on the appropriateness of management's use of the going concern basis of accounting and, based on the audit evidence obtained, whether a material uncertainty exists related to events or conditions that may cast significant doubt on Taawon's ability to continue as a going concern. If we conclude that a material uncertainty exists, we are required to draw attention in our auditor's report to the related disclosures in the financial statements or, if such disclosures are inadequate, to modify our opinion. Our conclusions are based on the audit evidence obtained up to the date of our auditor's report. However, future events or conditions may cause Taawon to cease to continue as a going concern.
- Evaluate the overall presentation, structure and content of the financial statements, including the disclosures, and whether the financial statements represent the underlying transactions and events in a manner that achieves fair presentation.

We communicate with the Board of Directors regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit and significant audit findings, including any significant deficiencies in internal control that we identify during our audit.
